Dear Mr. Volavka,

Upon review of the data submitted for this period, I would like to reply on those cases involving a significantly higher mortality rating.

- Heart Attacks Medical Management: 125 cases:
- There were sixteen deaths. Nine patients were from a SNF, all sixteen patients had multiple co-morbidities, eleven with DNR orders. The average age of these patients was 81.8.
- Pneumonia Infectious: 218 cases

There were sixteen deaths. Nine patients were from a SNF; all sixteen patients had multiple co-morbidities, thirteen with DNR orders, two care and comfort measures, and one hospice. The average age of these patients was 84.8.

Stroke – non Hemorrhagic: 53 cases

There were five deaths from strokes. All came through the ER and presented with multiple co-morbid conditions. Three were DNR, two care and comfort, three came from SNF. The average age of these patients was 90.8.

Hip Fracture, Surgical Repair: 39 cases There were five deaths S/P surgical repair. Three cases were cardiac arrest, two cases

were pneumonia S/P surgery. Three patients were from SNF. The average age of these patients was 90.

DRG 183 – Stomach and Intestinal Infections and Disorders, Uncomplicated::

There was one death. The 69 year-old patient came to the ER with a three-day history of constipation. Laxatives were taken the night before and BM was had in a.m. Then the abdominal pain began; nausea, no vomiting. KUB showed distended transverse colon, and stool in the sigmoid colon. WBC 14,000. Abdomen was soft throughout, positive bowel sounds. Patient was found to be apneic and pulseless; resuscitation was performed.

I hope the analysis of this report provides you with a better understanding of our patient climate in this rural area. At Shamokin Area Community Hospital, we pride ourselves in providing excellent care in the most efficient manner that we can.
